TWENTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL NEW YORK SWORD DANCE FESTIVAL
TO BE HELD FEB. 16-17 IN NEW YORK CITY

OPENS WITH PERFORMANCE AT SOUTH STREET SEAPORT

The 28th Annual New York Sword Dance Festival will be held in New York City, on Feb. 16-17, 2013. The event will feature 12 teams, as the performing groups are known, in an exciting weekend of performances in public spaces around the city. The festival, which Half Moon first organized in 1985, was the first such event in North America to focus on English-style sword dancing.

"When we held our first Sword Dance Festival back in 1985, there were no other teams in North America that only did sword dancing," says Deirdre Bialo-Padin, a founding member of the group. "Now there are groups all over the U.S. and some in Canada. We feel that the festival played a part in expanding the popularity of the dancing. Some people even formed groups just so they could come to the festival."

Sword dancing is a winter celebration practiced in the farming and coal-mining regions of northern England, where the annual visit of the local sword dancers to the village homes was thought to guarantee good luck for the year. The Festival will feature both mystical, stately longsword and vigorous rapper sword dancing, with live music on fiddle, accordion, and other instruments. In both types of sword dance, the dancers are linked in a ring by the "swords" they hold in their hands while they work as a team to weave intricate figures and patterns without breaking the circle. The dances are thought to have roots in ancient rituals, traces of which can still be seen in these present-day displays of skill. Performances will also include Morris dancing, Molly dancing, and related English folk traditions.

The event will kick-off with an opening performance at the Pier 17 Atrium at the South Street Seaport. The members of Half Moon hope that by bringing the Festival to the South Street Seaport, the team can contribute to the rebirth of the area as it strives to recover from the devastation wrought by Hurricane Sandy.

Additional performances will be held in numerous libraries, museums, churches, and other public spaces in Manhattan and Brooklyn. The festival will conclude with a grand finale in the auditorium at the Brooklyn Museum of Art on Sunday the 17th. All performances are free, although there is an admission charge to enter the museums.

The name Half Moon is inspired by Henry Hudson's ship, the Halve Maen, on which Henry Hudson voyaged to North America in 1609.
